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Cover Story

During the opening years of the American Revolution, the British dominated the Old Northwest (present-day Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin) from their military post at Detroit. Already angered at the white man's intrusion into their lands, the Indians allied themselves with the redcoats and devastated frontier settlements.


In 1777, the Americans found a man who would end Britain's dominance of the region. George Rogers Clark, a fiery young Virginian, decided that Indian attacks could best be ended by striking against the British posts north of the Ohio. During the winter of 1777-1778, Clark persuaded Governor Patrick Henry and the Virginia legislature to authorize an expedition against the villages of Kaskaskia, Cahokia, and Vincennes.

Clark's expedition culminated on February 23, 1779 as he and his men took up strategic positions around Fort Sackville, Indiana. The surprised British were unable to man their artillery because of Clark's sharpshooters, and, after a threat to storm the fort, formal surrender came on February 25, 1779.

The Journal of

Private Zebulon Vaughan

Revolutionary Soldier 1777 - 1780

The annual observance of American History Month, originated and fostered by the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, offers a further opportunity to reflect upon the events which led to securing our freedom. For a great many citizens who participated in the American Revolution it was a long eight years of uncertainty, of privation, of endurance; for the ordinary citizens turned soldier it was surely "a time that tried men's souls."

There is nothing ambiguous about these sentiments among those who suffered the hardships of battle, of marches, of fatigue; who were frequently hungry, cold, ill, and bored; whose pay was invariably in arrears. Surviving contemporary accounts reflect it all, and unique among the manuscripts in our Americana Collection is the journal of Zebulon Vaughan, a New England infantry soldier who somehow managed to record entries daily during his three-year term of service with the 5th Massachusetts Regiment.

Times were rare during the Revolution when victory prompted a celebration: after Burgoyne's troops were checked at the First Battle of Freeman's Farm in September 1777, General Gates . . . "mounted our provishon and pouder . . . made us to fier 13 cannon and then the houl army give three Chears which made the Camps to Ring . . ." Again, morale was high a few weeks later when Burgoyne's surrender followed the Second Battle of Freeman's Farm* . . . "this is the glorey of a miriakin

[miracle] Boys Now we have Shoed them how th amarken [American] Boys can fight . . ."

Although these victories at Saratoga led directly to an important alliance between the United States and France, eventually turning the tide in our favor, there was an agonizing period when the war in the north developed into a stalemate. With the British occupying New York City, blockading our eastern ports, and General Washington lacking the sea power to force them out, both sides engaged in haphazard and inconsequential hit-and-run raids.

Among foot soldiers such as Zebulon Vaughan serving out terms of enlistment, the misery of army life was their daily fare. Those who survived innoculation against the raging smallpox epidemic were confronted with other adversities: "Snowey day and one half of the Rigment is Bar footed waden Round in the snow without Shous to get wood and provishon—or go without . . . and we ar day after day without Bread . . ." No, not Washington's Valley Forge in 1777-1778, but the following winter in New York's Highlands near the Hudson River.

Occasionally there was relief from monotony, but even that could go sour. On I January 1779 Vaughan noted with some acrimony. ". . . the hapey New year But a Cused Comander Colo. putnam when the solders was glad to see th day fired Som guns and the old Cus praded

th holl Rigment and picked out them and whipt them without aney plea or given them the Benefut of ae Cort marshil . . ." each receiving "ten Stripe one [on] thar Naked Back . . ." Colonel Rufus Putnam evidently felt strongly about enforcing orders—firing guns was a punishable offence, not only because it wasted ammunition but could alarm those at a distance into mistaking it for an attack.

Zeb Vaughan's diary tells us a good deal about the morale of one soldier fighting in a deadlocked war who tenaciously held to his principles and resolutely carried out his duties in the midst of near famine and deserters until honorably discharged.**

The journal is unfortunately missing its first two pages; it begins on page four and contains a total of 188 pages. Measuring 3¾ inches by 6 inches, it has no cover and the spine is hand sewn with linen thread; some of the pages are torn, others badly discolored, and on a few the ink has faded to illegibility. Following is a transcription exactly as it was written including original spelling and punctuation; all words supplied by the editor are enclosed in brackets and illegible words or phrases are indicated---.



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Cover Story

The cover engraving of George Washington is a recent gift to the DAR Museum from the Continental Congress Pages, 1974-77. The engraving was executed by Edward Savage (1761-1817) in Boston, Massachusetts in 1792. Edward Savage also painted the portrait which was the source for this engraving. He worked in Boston, New York City and Philadelphia and is credited with making the first aquatints in America. This engraving is a particularly effective likeness of George Washington, depicted in full military uniform. On his left lapel is the Order of Cincinnati. This is the only engraving by Edward Savage in the DAR Museum collection.

This is a continuation of Zebulon Vaughan's journal begun in the February 1979 issue of the DAR Magazine. Serving a three-year term in the 5th Massachusetts Regiment under Col. Rufus Putnam, Vaughan saw active service at both Battles of Bemis Heights near Saratoga, reported the surrender of Gen. Burgoyne, and spent the remainder of his enlistment in New York's Highlands near the Hudson River.

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Cover Story

April 1979 marks the 50th Anniversary of the DAR Founders Memorial. In 1924, the 33rd Continental Congress passed a resolution authorizing the erection of a suitable memorial "to the memory of the four women to whose initiative, foresight and patriotic endeavor we owe the organization, on October 11, 1890, of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution." By 1917 Gloria Vanderbilt Whitney (Mrs. Harry Payne), noted sculptress of New York City, had been commissioned to execute the memorial. It is interesting to note that Mrs. Whitney was a DAR member, holding National No. 5451.

On April 17, 1929, during the 38th Continental Congress, the completed memorial was dedicated with Mrs. Charles W. Richardson, Chairman of the Day, presiding, assisted by Miss Aline Solomons, Chairman of the DAR Memorial Committee. President General Grace Lincoln Hall Brosseau accepted the statue. (See DAR Magazine, June 1929.) The first contribution of \$100, even before plans had been completed, was made by Mary Harrison McKee, daughter of the first President

General, Mrs. Benjamin Harrison.

Revolutionary Soldier 1777 - 1780

This is part three of Private Zebulon Vaughan's journal begun in the February 1979 issue of the DAR Magazine. Following the action at Saratoga and surrender of Burgoyne in 1777, he spent the remainder of his enlistment in the New York Highlands and was present in July 1779 when the British captured Stony Point; he reported Gen. Anthony Wayne's recapture of that fort in July, and commented on the occupation by American troops at Paulus Hook in New Jersey the following month.

These military victories, however, are overshadowed by Vaughan's preoccupation with survival as reflected in his daily comments on the drudgery of fatigue duty (hauling and "sawin plank for the youse of the forte at kings feere"), his judgment of rumors rampant ("the print gives ae Counte of two hundred thousand troops Comen to this place But I think it is ae wicked Ly"), and his resourcefulness in the face of starvation ("No provishon today oneley one partridg i Caute in a trapp and a few Small fish").

During the winter of 1779 surgeon James Thacher, attached to another Massachusetts Regiment along the Hudson River, confirmed the widespread misery of the circumstances in his own journal as well as his admiration

for those with indefatigable spirit and resolution who carried out their duties. "... the men find it very difficult to pitch their tents on the frozen ground, and notwithstanding large fires, we can scarcely keep from freezing. ... the whole army has been for seven or eight days entirely destitute of the staff of life; our only food is miserable fresh beef, without bread, salt, or vegetables."

It is a circumstance greatly to be deprecated, that the army, who are devoting their lives and every thing dear to the defense of our country's freedom, should be subjected to such unparalleled privations, while in the midst of a country abounding in every kind of provisions... it is to be ascribed to their patriotism, and to a sense of honor and duty, that they have not long since abandoned the cause of their country. The heroic fortitude with which our officers and soldiers support their distresses, proclaims their fidelity and intrinsic merit."*

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May's cover features a special exhibition of Chinese export silver on loan to the National Society Children of the American Revolution Museum. The N.S.C.A.R. Museum is a museum for children and young adults which specializes in interpreting the decorative and applied arts found in and imported to America from the Colonial through the Federal periods. Fifty-eight exhibition cases trace with artifacts various stages in domestic and military development in America. The museum's permanent collection contains examples of English and American silver, 18th century English furniture, textiles, American free-blown and pressed glass, numismatics and Chinese export porcelain.

The current loan exhibition illustrates the variety of craftsmanship demonstrated by the Chinese silversmith—from a typical Western beveled fiddle pattern soup ladle (circa 1830) to tea sets with elaborate repoussé decoration (ca. 1875). Of special interest are a pair of cans which still have their original silk presentation boxes and the label of their maker. This Chinese export silver has never been on exhibition in Washington, D.C. and will remain on view through April 1980. The N.S.C.A.R. Museum is located at 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006 and is open Monday through Friday, 9-4. Admission is free. Cover photo by Betsey Himmel.

This is the fourth and final part of Zebulon Vaughan's Revolutionary War journal. (See February, March, April 1979 issues of the DAR Magazine). Although most of the journal's last eighteen pages are devoted to randomly arranged accounts, there is also a "sarmon" against drunkenness, a memorandum concerning his Massachusetts state lottery ticket, a plea for prompt payment of soldiers' wages, a prayer for General George Washington, a list of regimental officers, and names of doctors at the smallpox hospital in Schenectady, New York. The entries are reproduced here as faithfully as possible given modern typesetting.

Zebulon, the son of Joseph and Hannah Vaughan, was born 8 June 1744 in Middleborough, Plymouth County, Massachusetts. Little is known of his life; however, there is a record of his marriage on 3 January 1765 by a Justice of the Peace to Mercy Pratt, also of Middleborough.


In March 1818 Congress passed the Act which provided for pensions to soldiers of the American Revolution. Within a month Vaughan applied claiming that he first enlisted in 1775 as a corporal under Captain Amos Wade, Cotton's Massachusetts Regiment, Roxbury, for about eight months, and that the following year he served five months in New York state as a private under Captain Nathaniel Wood. In May 1777, Vaughan enlisted for a

three-year term in Colonel Rufus Putnam's 5th Massachusetts Regiment, under the company command of Captain Joshua Benson. On 14 May 1780, Putnam signed a statement certifying that Zebulon Vaughan had served "the full term of his Inlistment, has conducted himself as a good and Faithful soldier, and is hereby Discharged the Service." His pension amounted to eight dollars per

Appearing before the Circuit Court of Common Pleas in Plymouth County on 17 July 1820 to reaffirm his eligibility for the pension, Vaughan declared he owned no real estate and "My family consists of my self & wife aged 77 years 1 daughter Mercy Faunce aged 35 a poor widow my occupation is a house carpenter but I am too far advanced in life to be able to realize any thing valuable from sd. occupation. I also owe a small sum." His personal property included "6 old chairs, crockery ware, iron ware, other articles of house furniture" valued at \$8.50.

A few months later in Middleborough, Mercy (Pratt) Vaughan died on 28 October 1820. Zebulon lived on into his 90th year and died 23 February 1824.




